

#### **Climate and Environment Group Report**

#### **Group Meeting**

Please join us at 10.45am in Clunbury Village Hall on Friday 20 September to hear about our various ongoing activities and discuss plans for an event in November. Coffee and biscuits on arrival, meeting starts at 11am. All welcome.

#### Whinberry Hill

We led a group of 48 children from Clunbury, Bucknell and Newcastle schools on a visit to Whinberry Hill on 17 July. As we walked there along the forestry tracks we compared the bare ground beneath the dense conifers with the fringe of heather and whinberry and with the ribbon of vegetation along the edge of the tracks where Bird's-foot-trefoil and Wild Strawberry flourish. We then went picking Whinberries.

#### **Parish Walks**

Saturday 10 August was not ideal weather for our third Parish walk but six of us braved the damp morning and headed out of Clunton, up towards Merry Hill. Thanks must go to the kind soul who had cut back vegetation in the short stretch of wood to the clearing on the summit. From here we took the steep, direct route down to Kempton and joined the Shropshire Way through a newly installed 'kissing gate'. We stopped for coffee under the boughs of an oak tree, giving us some protection from the rain. There was then a gentle climb through the National Trust Walcot Wood. Just before turning left onto the road to Clunton we noticed a child sized shelter tucked behind the hedge which now only protects a letter box. It was then downhill all the way, passing below Dawes Lines through a beautiful flower rich meadow and on to Stepple Farm. At this point the sun finally shone giving a lovely view down the valley. ## September in the garden

With the children back to school and autumn fast approaching the harvests from the garden are coming in quickly now.

This month we'll be making tomato sauce, pickling cucumbers, freezing chillies and pepper and processing apples and blackberries into pie filling ready for the winter.

While storing the bounty there's also time to sow a few more things to give us winter salads and an early start on next year's harvest.





With the protection of a greenhouse, polytunnel or net you can grow lots throughout winter.

This month we can sow:

- winter lettuce, winter spinach, mustard leaves, claytonia, cornsalad, rocket, chard, mizuna,
- brassicas such as spring cauliflower, spring cabbage, kale, kohl rabi and broccoli.
- Bi annual flowers such as snap dragons, cornflowers, love in a mist and poppies car
  be sown too.

Growing over winter poses less issues with many pests such as butterflies and flea beetles

The growth slows in the darker months as the plant becomes dormant and then bursts into life once the light levels return in mid February giving us an early crop.

Gathering supplies for mulching of compost or manure to feed the soil will help it to feed us for another year.
